PART 1 • REGISTRATION

The 3-Day Window

Critical dates

Open registration window: June 29, 2026 at 9:30 AM ET — July 1, 2026 at 12:30 PM ET.

What you do during this window: enter your ranked course preferences in Banner. You are *not* registering yet — you are telling the system what you want.

When you'll see your schedule: Within 48 hours after the registration window closes on July 1.

Add/Drop Period: begins July 27, 2026 and runs through the first week of classes. You'll have time to fix things.

You are not racing other students

Registration is a lottery, not first-come-first-served. It makes **no difference** whether you submit your worksheet at 9:31 AM on June 29 or at 12:29 PM on July 1. Just submit it sometime in the window.

Pre-registration checklist

Do these before June 29. If anything here is unresolved, you may be locked out of registering on time.

■ Computer set to English	Banner links may not work if your browser is set to another language.
■ You've read this guide	Especially Part 2 (your program's requirements) and the NY Bar section if it applies to you.
■ You've attended (or watched) one curriculum workshop	Recordings are available if you missed the live session.
■ You have these reference materials open	Fall 2026 JD & LLM Course List, Tentative Exam Schedule, Academic Calendar — all on the Cardozo Registrar website.
■ You've written down course numbers and CRN #s	You'll enter the CRN or course title in the worksheet; it auto-fills the rest.
■ You've checked for time conflicts	The system will not register you for two courses that overlap, even by one minute.

Heads up: some courses don't open until August

A few classes will **not** be available to register for until the Add/Drop period starts on July 27. Check the **Comments** column on the Fall 2026 LLM and JD Course List.

How the lottery actually works

When you submit your worksheet, you are **telling the computer your ranked preferences**. After the window closes, a program goes through every student's submission in random order and tries to enroll them in their courses.

Round 1 — your top choice

The program tries to put you in your **Primary Choice #1**. If that course is full, it tries your **Alternate #1**. If both are full, it moves on.

Round 2 — your second course

The program reshuffles the order of students and goes through again, trying to give everyone their second course. Students who got nothing in Round 1 go to the front of the line this time.

Repeat until you're done

It keeps going for each numbered choice on your list, until you're at the credit cap or out of choices. **Maximum credits that can be assigned during the lottery: 14 credits.**

The single most useful trick

If you want Course A first and Course B second, put Course B in **both** Alternate #1 *and* Primary Choice #2. That way the computer tries to get you Course B whether or not you got Course A. You can repeat this pattern down your list.

Ranking your courses: 3 worked examples

Example 1 — Normal case: pick 4 courses in order of preference

You want Trademark most. Then Corporations. Then Contracts. Then Media Law. You also want a safe fallback (Intro to U.S. Law, which always has room for international students).

Rank	Primary choice	Alternate
1	Trademark	Corporations
2	Corporations	Contracts
3	Contracts	Media Law
4	Media Law	Introduction to U.S. Law
5	Adv. LLW LLM I	

Why this works: each course you want appears twice — once as a Primary, once as an Alternate — so the computer has two chances to enroll you.

Example 2 — You don't care which section

You really want **Contract Drafting**, either section A or B. Then you want Real Estate Reporter and Trademark.

Rank	Primary choice	Alternate
1	Contract Drafting A	Contract Drafting B
2	R.E. Reporter	Trademark
3	Trademark	4th choice course

Why this works: the two sections of Contract Drafting are paired at the same level, so the computer treats them as "either is fine." Just don't list the same section twice.

Example 3 — Your top two choices meet at the same time

You want Entertainment Law. If you can't get it, you'd take Real Estate Finance — but they meet at the same time. Then you want Trademark, then Legislation.

Rank	Primary choice	Alternate
1	Entertainment Law	Real Estate Finance
2	Trademark	Legislation
3	Legislation	4th choice course

Why this works: Real Estate Finance only appears as an alternate, because if you got into Entertainment Law you couldn't also take Real Estate Finance (time conflict). Putting it as Primary #2 would have wasted that slot.

Where to find the courses themselves

The Fall 2026 LLM & JD Course List (on the Cardozo Registrar website) shows: Course Number, Section, CRN, Professor, # of Credits, Permission Required, Meeting Day, Meeting Times, Room, Enrollment Cap, NY Bar Component, Skills/Writing Credits, and **Comments** — read the Comments column!

Step by step in Banner

Step 1 — Log in to Inside Track

Go to <https://insidetrack.yu.edu>.

- **Username:** Active Directory name. For most students, this is the email prefix of your @law.cardozo.yu.edu address.
- **Password (default):** first letter of your last name + last four digits of your SSN. International students with no SSN: first letter of last name + last four digits of your Banner ID.
- Locked out? Email helpdesk@yu.edu.

Step 2 — Open the Student Dashboard

- Click the "hamburger" menu (top left) and choose **Students**.
- On the **Student Frequently Used Links** card, click **Student Dashboard**.

Step 3 — Find the right link

Use the right link

In the Registration section of the Student Dashboard, click "**CSL Course Selection Worksheet**". **Do NOT** click "Add/Drop Courses." That's a different tool for the Add/Drop period in August.

Step 4 — Choose the right term

- Select the regular **Fall** term — **not** "Fall Zman."

Step 5 — Enter your desired courses

- Select the **CRN #** or the course title from their respective drop downs. The rest of the course info auto-fills.
- Select **Choice 1** and **Alternate 1**, then Choice 2 / Alternate 2, and so on down your ranked list.
- Add 1–2 extra courses at the bottom in case some fill up. It's easier to drop than to add later.

Step 6 — Click Save

If you don't click "Save", you didn't register

Hit the **SAVE** button at the bottom of the worksheet. Print or screenshot your submission for your records.

Step 7 — Edit before the window closes (if needed)

Until July 1 at 12:30 PM ET, you can come back and change things. To edit a row, you can click on the **CRN**, **Primary/Alternate Course Title**, or **Choice** dropdowns to make changes. To delete a row select the row that you want to delete, and click "**Delete Selected**" — this deletes both the Choice and the Alternate. **Make sure to hit Save when you're done!**

Common mistakes to avoid

■ Listing permission-only classes	These can't be added through lottery. See the course selection FAQs on the Registrar's page.
■ Ignoring time conflicts	Even a one-minute overlap means the computer skips the second course. Check meeting days/times (and remember R = Thursday) and that some classes meet split days — like a course that meets MTWRF + Tuesday. You must attend every meeting listed for a section.
■ Ignoring exam conflicts	Check the Tentative Exam Schedule. Two finals on the same day is rough. Consult with Hui before deciding whether to keep both classes.
■ Missing pre- and co-requisites	You are responsible for meeting them. The course list flags them.
■ Forgetting to click SAVE	Easy to do, especially after editing. Always end your session on SAVE.
■ Not listing extras	Without backups, you can end up under 12 credits and short on options at Add/Drop.

After you submit

A few days after July 1	Log back into Banner. Your computed schedule will appear — the courses the lottery actually placed you into.
July 27	Add/Drop Period opens. Use the Add/Drop Courses link (not the worksheet) to swap, add, or drop.
First week of classes	Add/Drop closes at the end of the first week. After that, schedule changes get harder.
Throughout the semester	Watch your Cardozo email for Registrar reminders. Some clinic and externship application processes happen mid-semester.

Quick reminder for international students

You can't apply for clinics in your first semester — clinic info sessions and applications happen during the semester for the spring. Domestic LL.M. students *can* apply for clinics/externships in semester one: email corina.bogaciu@yu.edu.

Programs, Credits & Bar Requirements

Programs at a glance

Cardozo offers four LL.M. degree programs. You picked one at admission. The General Studies program optionally lets you declare a concentration in your second semester.

Program	Total credits	Min. credits in the field	Special requirements
Comparative Legal Thought (CLT)	24	12 in CLT coursework	3-credit thesis in your second semester. NY Bar candidates: thesis is on top of the 24 credits.
Intellectual Property (IP)	24 (domestic) 26 (NY Bar)	14 in IP coursework	At least 2 of: Copyright, Trademark, Patents. Bar candidates add 12 credits of NY Bar courses.
Dispute Resolution & Advocacy (DRA)	24	14 in DRA coursework	Scholarly paper (B or higher) on a DRA topic + experiential requirement (externship, clinic, or 60+ pro bono hours).
General Studies (GS)	24	12 NY Bar required + 12 electives	Optional concentration (min. 8 credits) chosen in semester 2. Nine concentrations available.

GS concentrations (optional, declare in semester 2)

Business, Corporate & Finance • Criminal • Dispute Resolution • Family • FAME (Fashion, Arts, Media & Entertainment) • Intellectual Property • International & Comparative • Privacy, Cybersecurity & Data • Real Estate. Each concentration requires a minimum of **8 credits** across required and elective courses.

Credit rules

Full-time vs. part-time

Full-time	9 – 14 credits per semester. Charged per semester. Can finish in one academic year.
Part-time	Up to 8 credits per semester. Charged per credit. Must finish within 24 months to meet NY Bar requirements.
Visa students (F-1 or J-1)	Must be full-time.
FAFSA (U.S. citizens / green card holders)	At least 6 credits per semester required.
Going above 14 credits (international students)	Requires written permission from Dean Val (Myteberi).
Lottery cap during registration	Maximum 14 credits during the open window. You can add more (if eligible) during Add/Drop.

The 24-credit graduation requirement

All LL.M. degree candidates must complete at least 24 credits. Transfer LL.M. students must complete at least 18 credits at Cardozo.

The 24-credit NY Bar requirement

All LL.M. degree candidates who seek to meet the NY Bar educational requirements must complete at least 24 credits. At Least 18 of those must be in-class credits.

Within the 24 credits:

- **Max 6 credits** from clinics or externships count.
- **Max 4 credits** from Summer Session count (and part-time students must pay per-credit summer tuition for those credits to count).
- **Winter Session** courses don't count toward the 24.
- **LL.M. Thesis** doesn't count toward the 24.
- **Independent Study** doesn't count toward the 24.
- **Study Abroad** doesn't count toward the 24.

One credit = 54 minutes of in-class instruction per week.

Required courses for international students

"International student" here means any LL.M. or Exchange student who earned (or is earning) their first law degree outside the U.S.A. These three courses are required. They also satisfy specific NY Bar rules.

Course	When	What it covers	NY Bar rule
Introduction to U.S. Law	First semester	Basics of the U.S. legal system: federal structure, use of precedent, reading and analyzing case law.	520.6(b)(3)(vi)(c)
Adv. Workshop in Legal Research & Writing I (Adv LLW – LLM – I)	First semester	Case reading and analysis, basic language and writing skills, manual + computer-assisted research, letter and memo writing.	520.6(b)(3)(vi)(b)
Adv. Workshop in Legal Research & Writing II (Adv LLW – LLM – II)	Second semester (<i>not concurrently with Part I</i>)	Advocacy writing: litigation drafting and appellate brief writing.	520.6(b)(3)(vi)(b)

New York Bar Exam: are you eligible?

Only the **NY Board of Law Examiners (BOLE)** can determine your eligibility. You must apply on their website for a credentials evaluation. Cardozo's role is to confirm your LL.M. completion afterwards.

Two paths to eligibility

Common-law country graduates (3+ years of law study) — e.g., U.K., Ireland, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Israel — are often eligible based on that legal education alone, and may not *need* the LL.M. for bar eligibility. You still need a determination from BOLE.

Civil-law / non-traditional / mixed-system graduates may qualify for the NY Bar after completing an LL.M. at an ABA-accredited school. Cardozo is ABA-accredited and all our LL.M. programs meet the NY Bar requirements. You still need a determination from BOLE.

Strict BOLE deadlines

February bar exam: documents must reach BOLE by **May 1**.

July bar exam: documents must reach BOLE by **October 1**.

BOLE review takes **6+ months**. Plan backwards.

Documents BOLE may require

These are examples only — follow BOLE's specific instructions for your case. Save your **BOLE ID #** and put it on every document.

- Official transcripts (translated to English, stamped, signed, and sealed), sent directly by your home university to BOLE.
- Degree certificate, if the transcript doesn't clearly state the degree awarded.
- Proof of admission to practice law in your home country, OR proof that you have completed all educational requirements to practice law there.
- Proof that an accrediting agency in your home country recognizes your law school.
- Your LL.M. degree certificate and transcript — sent by Cardozo's Registrar after you finish.
- Sworn English translations of any non-English documents.

These examples are only listed here to help guide you, but you must follow BOLE instructions and each case depends on the educational requirements of the home country, so please follow up with NY BOLE directly.

NY Bar required courses at Cardozo

If you're sitting for the NY Bar, you must take **at least 2 credits in each of categories (a), (b), (c) and at least 6 credits in (d)**. Cardozo courses that satisfy each are below.

(a) Professional responsibility — min. 2 credits **RULE 520.6(b)(3)(vi)(a)**

Required for: history, goals, instruction, value, rules, and responsibilities of the U.S. legal profession.

- Professional Responsibility for LL.M.s (2 or 3 credits)

(b) Legal research, writing & analysis — min. 2 credits **RULE 520.6(b)(3)(vi)(b)**

- Advanced Workshop in Legal Research & Writing Part I (1 credit) — first semester
- Advanced Workshop in Legal Research & Writing Part II (1 credit) — second semester
- Listed in Banner as **Adv LLW – LLM I** and **Adv LLW – LLM II**. Total = 2 credits.

(c) American legal studies / legal system — min. 2 credits **RULE 520.6(b)(3)(vi)(c)**

Intro to U.S. Law is required for all new international students and counts here.

- **24 credits** to graduate
- Minimum **12 credits** in Comparative Legal Thought coursework
- **3-credit thesis** written under faculty supervision in your second semester
- **NY Bar candidates:** the thesis (3 credits) is *on top of* the 24 credits of coursework, and you must complete the Court requirements on the NY Bar page.

Additional requirements (on top of IP track)

- **26 credits total** (vs. 24 for domestic IP)
- Minimum **14 credits** in IP coursework
- **12 credits** in NY Bar required courses (these are *on top of* the 14 IP credits)
- Same required IP courses: **2 of 3** from Copyright, Trademark, Patents — one in your first semester
- Follow all the NY Bar requirements in Part 2

3. Dispute Resolution and Advocacy (DRA)

Requirements

- **24 credits** to graduate
- Minimum **14 credits** in DRA coursework
- **Scholarly paper** earning a B or higher on a DRA topic. Examples: a 20+ page paper for a course or independent study; a substantive memorandum, draft opinion, or brief for a course/clinic/externship. **Faculty approval required** before the writing requirement is satisfied.
- **Experiential requirement:** participate in a DRA-related externship, internship, clinic, or practical program — or complete 60+ hours of supervisor-certified pro bono work.

- NY Bar candidates: follow the Court rules in Part 2

Optional concentration (declare in semester 2)

Each concentration requires a minimum of **8 credits** across required and elective courses. You can graduate with the General Studies LL.M. without a concentration if you prefer broader coursework. The nine concentrations follow on the next pages.

Exchange students don't use the Course Selection Worksheet during the open window. Instead, you'll take **two** steps:

- **During June 29 – July 1, 2026:** make the same kind of ranked list (Primary + Alternate for each preference) and email it to Hui Yang at hui.yang@yu.edu. She'll share your interest with the Registrar. *This step does not register you.*
- **During Add/Drop starting July 27:** log into Banner and click the **Add/Drop Courses** link to add your selections and complete registration. If a class is closed, pick an alternative. J.D. and LL.M. students are prioritized in the initial window, but Exchange students still end up in great classes.
